BENJAMIN KHUMALO, one of our 1969 Afrikaans Orators, represented our school in the pre-liminary round of the contest held at Bechet High. The finals of this speech contest will be held at Pietermaritzburg on the 15th of June, 1970.

DIFFICULT TOPIC:

BENJAMIN KHUMALO spoke on the topic: "Growing threats to our Environment". Benjamin sees three main threats to our environment: (a) Overpopulation (b) Air pollution and (c) Communism. In his speech he emphasised that there are many "YURI LUGINOVS" concealed in our midst. Five of the six candidates spoke on "Growing Threats to our Environment" and only one spoke on "Give me Neither Riches nor Poverty".

IMPROMPTU SPEECHES:

AFTER the Contestants had delivered their prepared Speeches, they each had to return to the stage to deliver impromptu speeches, the topics for which they had to choose only five minutes before rising to address the Audience for the second time. For the impromptu speech Benjamin chose the topic "Why I dislike a Mirror" and showed such quick wit and depth of intellect blended with humour that the Adjudicators could not but give him 2nd position.
